Seokwoo LEE is Professor of International Law, Inha University Law School, Korea (2003-present), where he is also working as Director of Inha Int'l Ocean Law Centre. He was Vice Dean for External Affairs, Inha University Law School (2009; 2012-2014).

He has conducted research at a number of institutions including the University of Tokyo, Harvard University, Georgetown University, Oxford University, Durham University, and George Washington University, and has taught at Xiamen University, China (2009), University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, USA (2013), and Zhejiang University, China (2013).

He is Chairman of the Foundation for the Development of International Law in Asia (DILA) (2012-2015) and now serving as Chairman of the Development of International Law in Asia-Korea (DILA-KOREA) which is a new academic entity which is responsible for DILA along with the *Asian Yearbook of International Law* (AsianYbIL) and Asia Pacific Ocean Law Institutions Alliance (APOLIA).

He is a member of the Advisory Board for the Sustaining Coastal and Marine Zones of the University of Wollongong (UOW) Global Challenges Program in Australia, and a member of the board directors of the Jon Van Dyke Institute of International Law and Justice, William S. Richardson School of Law (WSRSL), University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, USA.

He served as Chairman of Research Committee, SLOC (Sea Lanes of Communication) Study Group-Korea (2010-2013) and Director of International Relations, Korean Society of International Law (2010-2011).

His representative recent governmental and societal activities in Korea include The Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Advisory Board for Dokdo Policy; Korea Coast Guard, Committee on the International Law of the Sea; Northeast Asian History Foundation, Dokdo Research Institute, Advisory Board for Dokdo Policy; and Province of Gyeongsangbuk-Do, Legal Advisor to the Dokdo Safeguard Team.

He is the Co-Editors-in-Chief of *Asia-Pacific Journal of Ocean Law and Policy* (APJOLP), the Executive Editor of *The Korean*

Journal of International and Comparative Law (KJICL) and the Co-Series Editors of the book series entitled *Maritime Cooperation in East Asia*, all published by Brill. He is also an editorial board member of the *Australian Journal of Maritime and Ocean Affairs*.

He has extensive experience in organizing more than 30 major international conferences, including the Annual LOSI International Conference on the Law of the Sea and Ocean Policy with Law of the Sea Institute, UC Berkeley.

He has authored more than 60 publications in English in addition to his more than 60 publications in Korean.
